9.22 shall affix to such article or animal a tag or other appropriate marking giving notice that

9.25 article or animal by sale or otherwise until permission for removal or disposal is given by  
9.26 such agent or the court. It shall be unlawful for any person to remove or dispose of such  
9.27 detained or embargoed article or animal by sale or otherwise without such permission.

9.28 Subd. 2. **Action for condemnation.** When an article or animal detained or  
9.29 embargoed under subdivision 1 has been found by such agent to be adulterated, or  
9.30 misbranded, the agent shall petition the district court in the county in which the article or  
9.31 animal is detained or embargoed for an order and decree for the condemnation of such  
9.32 article or animal. Any such agent who has found that an article or animal so detained or  
9.33 embargoed is not adulterated or misbranded, shall remove the tag or other marking.

9.34 Subd. 3. **Remedies.** If the court finds that a detained or embargoed article or animal  
9.35 is adulterated or misbranded, such article or animal shall, after entry of the decree, be

10.1 destroyed at the expense of the claimant thereof, under the supervision of such agent, and  
10.2 all court costs and fees, and storage and other proper expenses, shall be taxed against  
10.3 the claimant of such article or animal or the claimant's agent; provided, that when the  
10.4 adulteration or misbranding can be corrected by proper labeling or processing of the article  
10.5 or animal, the court, after entry of the decree and after such costs, fees, and expenses have

10.8 be delivered to claimant thereof for such labeling or processing under the supervision of
