1.11	on consumer products consisting of nine voting members. The council members shall
1.12	be as follows:

1.14	Committees of the Committee on Rules and Administration, and speaker of the house;
1.15	(2) one representative of a business organization each appointed by the governor,
1.16	senate Subcommittee on Committees of the Committee on Rules and Administration,
1.17	and speaker of the house;
1.18	(3) one representative of an environmental health organization each appointed by
1.19	the governor, senate Subcommittee on Committees of the Committee on Rules and
