

2.1 (6) contain a space where the applicant may request a veteran designation on the
2.2 license under section 171.07, subdivision 15, and the driving record under section 171.12,
2.3 subdivision 5a; and

2.4 (7) contain a space where the applicant must attest to a residence address in
2.5 Minnesota.

2.6 (b) If the applicant does not indicate a desire to make an anatomical gift when
2.7 the application is made, the applicant must be offered a donor document in accordance
2.8 with section 171.07, subdivision 5. The application must contain statements sufficient to
2.9 comply with the requirements of the Darlene Luther Revised Uniform Anatomical Gift
2.10 Act, chapter 525A, so that execution of the application or donor document will make
2.11 the anatomical gift as provided in section 171.07, subdivision 5, for those indicating a
2.12 desire to make an anatomical gift. The application must be accompanied by information
2.13 describing Minnesota laws regarding anatomical gifts and the need for and benefits of
2.14 anatomical gifts, and the legal implications of making an anatomical gift, including the
2.15 law governing revocation of anatomical gifts. The commissioner shall distribute a notice
2.16 that must accompany all applications for and renewals of a driver's license or Minnesota
2.17 identification card. The notice must be prepared in conjunction with a Minnesota organ
2.18 procurement organization that is certified by the federal Department of Health and Human
2.19 Services and must include:

2.20 (1) a statement that provides a fair and reasonable description of the organ donation
2.21 process, the care of the donor body after death, and the importance of informing family
2.22 members of the donation decision; and

2.23 (2) a telephone number in a certified Minnesota organ procurement organization that
2.24 may be called with respect to questions regarding anatomical gifts.

2.25 (c) The application must be accompanied also by information containing relevant
2.26 facts relating to:

2.27 (1) the effect of alcohol on driving ability;

2.28 (2) the effect of mixing alcohol with drugs;

2.29 (3) the laws of Minnesota relating to operation of a motor vehicle while under the
2.30 influence of alcohol or a controlled substance; and

2.31 (4) the levels of alcohol-related fatalities and accidents in Minnesota and of arrests
2.32 for alcohol-related violations.

2.33 (d) A government identification card is (1) an acceptable form of proof of identity in
2.34 application for a Minnesota identification card, instruction permit, or driver's license; and
2.35 (2) a primary document for purposes of Minnesota Rules, part 7410.0400.

3.1 (e) For purposes of this section, "government identification card" means an official
3.2 form of governmental identification issued by a country other than the United States,
3.3 that contains:

3.4 (1) the full name and date of birth of the cardholder;

3.5 (2) a photograph identifying the cardholder;

3.6 (3) a unique identification number; and

3.7 (4) security features that make the card as impervious to alteration as is reasonably
3.8 practicable in its design and quality of material and technology, using materials that are
3.9 not readily available to the general public.
